Community development at Council

It is often forgotten that the community sector is a key provider of jobs in an economy. Many community organisations struggle to gain funding to meet day to day operating expenses let alone develop opportunities for growth.

With many organisations being run by dedicated volunteers there is often not the time or skills available to maximise funding opportunities available. Council believes the community sector offers job creation potential. In order to maximise this potential the sector requires support in the areas of governance and funding. For its community development service, Council is focused on the following objectives:

- » Assist community groups and projects with regulatory barriers and access to external funding
- » Better connect Council decision making to desired community outcomes
- » Provide on-going community input into Council Long-Term and Annual Plan processes through community-led development
- » Access external funding for Council projects



Fundraising support

Discussion with a range of community organisations has identified a strong need for support with fundraising.

Many organisations are not applying for funding that is currently open to them due to lack of resources and/or skills.

Council now provides support for fundraising:

- » helping groups and individuals access funds by directing to funding portals and databases
- » connecting groups and individuals to funders that can provide advice and guidance on where and how to apply
- » supporting non-commercial groups and individuals with applications to funds (with the aim of up-skilling groups to be able to complete applications independently in the future)
- » building a database to capture funds and fund seekers to alert them of relevant upcoming opportunities

Te Awa Community Foundation

A Trust Deed creating the Te Awa Community Foundation was signed in late 2018 to establish a Community Foundation that encompasses the Horizon's region. This region incorporates the districts of Ruapehu, Rangitikei, Whanganui, Manawatū, Tararua and Palmerston North City.

People can give to the Community Foundation, with their money being pooled and invested. The income generated from the investments is returned to community causes of their choice, through a grant-making programme that will keep in step with the changing needs of local communities for generations to come.

The inaugural Te Awa Community Foundation Trustees have come together, with a view to developing an organisation that will support and positively impact communities from throughout the region. Trusteeships are voluntary, which is a cornerstone feature of Community Foundations. The Trustees will be supported by local committees and key advisory boards, to ensure a whole of region approach.



Te Awa in Tararua

Tararua District Council has worked with the Te Awa Community Foundation to create local funds that ensure people in our communities can give and invest for the benefit of the place where they live.

Council has seed funded seven local Te Awa funds for communities across the district to donate or apply to, these are:

- » General Tararua District Fund
- » Norsewood and Ormondville Fund
- » Pongaroa and the Coast Fund
- » Dannevirke Fund
- » Eketāhuna Fund
- » Woodville Fund
- » Pahiatua Fund

The Aotearoa Gaming Trust (AGT) is a society that is licensed to operate gaming machines at venues throughout New Zealand.

The Trust has held a licence since 1998 and currently operates about 550 machines in 45 venues.

Income from these machines is distributed back into the local authority area in which it was generated by way of grants.

Grants made cover the spectrum of amateur sport, education, arts, health and community.

Organisations looking to apply for a grant must be not-for-profit and able to show a minimum of 12 months full operating.

The amount of funding available for distribution is governed purely by the income received from the venues.

The Central Energy Trust (CET) was created on the establishment of CentralPower Limited in 1993.

In 2001 the Trust realised its interest in the company when Powerco merged with CentralPower Limited, and became the controlling entity.

The capital fund arising from the sell down has been invested in fixed interest securities and equities, and the resultant income is available for distribution.

Grants

CET provides grants to community, sporting, educational, cultural and health organisations within the Manawatu/Tararua regions for projects which are energy-related and which will benefit the consumer's of the former CentralPower/ElectroPower energy companies (see website for map).

Bursaries

Each Bursary will be awarded for up to three years and have a value of up to \$4,000, with the period and amount dependent on the type and duration of study. Half of the bursary is normally paid for the first year of study and the balance in equal instalments over the remaining period of the bursary.

The scheme is a partnership between Tararua District Council and Creative New Zealand that helps to fund local arts projects.

There are two funding rounds each year in March and September. If there are no rounds open, you can still get in touch with us to discuss your options and find out if this is the right fund for you.

To get funding through the scheme, your arts project must do at least one of the following:

create opportunities for local communities to engage with, and participate in, arts activities support the diverse arts and cultural traditions of local communities enable and encourage under-18s to engage with the arts

To be eligible for funding, your project must:

have an arts or cultural focus take place within Tararua District benefit local communities

not have started before an application for funding has been assessed not have been funded by Creative NZ for the same purpose

The Department of Internal Affairs provides support and information about Central Government and Lottery funds available to community organisations and charities.

Community Organisation Grants Scheme (COGS) grants funding to community-based social services that contribute to local outcomes for:

on-going operational costs community projects or events

Lottery Community Fund grants funding to help improve the quality of people's lives in the community:

on-going operational costs community projects or events

minor capital works projects valued at \$50,000 or less community development costs, such as hui, training, planning, evaluation and facilitator fees

Eastern & Central

Eastern & Central Community Trust (ECCT) provides grants and support to community organisations operating in the Gisborne Tairāwhiti, Hawke's Bay, Tararua, Manawatū, Horowhenua and Wairarapa districts. There are two main funds open for grants on an ongoing basis:

The **Grassroots Fund** is to ensure communities have access to services, events and initiatives that they value. It is designed to support a broad range of positive activities that contribute to ECCT's Priority Outcomes, to achieve our vision. There are four funding pathways under which organisations can apply for funding – Participation, Service, Development and Education. In general, funding can go towards operating costs, programme costs, coaching, events, equipment, small assets, vehicles, repairs and maintenance, and grassroot regional or local activities. The Grassroots Fund is contestable and can grant up to \$30,000 (GST excl.). Capital projects can receive up to \$50,000 (GST excl.). Guarantees Against Loss of up to \$20,000 (GST excl.) are available for significant local and district events.

The **Community Assets Facilities Fund (CAFF)** is designed to help communities create and maintain the community assets and facilities needed to meaningfully participate in community life. This fund is for projects that need funding of between \$30,000 - \$250,000. If you have a community asset that needs to be built, developed, or maintained, have a conversation with us about how we may be able to help.

Please note: we are unlikely to fully fund a project by ourselves. We may ask if you have other funders arranged, and how much you will be putting towards a project yourselves. If interested in the CAFF – the first step is to speak to our Community Advisor who will guide you through the process.

We work across all of our region's seven districts, including Tararua, to make our place a healthy environment where the people thrive. However, we know that many of our rural and urban communities are doing their own great work to improve the health of our environment and enhance the wellbeing of their communities.

We're proud to say we support a number of community groups through our grants and contestable funding opportunities.

Waireka Community Trust seeks to make a positive impact on the communities of Pahiatua, Eketāhuna and Woodville by making charitable distributions in the area.

The Trust funds invested have been successfully managed by Craigs Investment Partners since 2008.

For the 2020 year the Trust had a return on investments of \$347,806 (2019: \$477,361). This represents a return of 7.8%.

Trustees will consider applications for grants every six months, with closing dates in February and August each financial year.

The objectives set out in the Trust Deed are broad to allow the Trustees to consider a wide range of charitable distributions.
