# The Verification of a Food Control Plan

Food Act 2014

## What Does Verification Mean?

- "Verification" is the term used to check the Food Control Plan (FCP) is accurately tailored.
- A "reality check" of the business is also undertaken at this time.
- Verification is different from inspection, you tell us, not we tell you how to operate.
- Verification is made by appointment, not by surprise.
- The verification process will provide food business guidance on "opportunities for improvement".

#### **The Verification Process**

- Your first verification will take place within one month of receiving your completed FCP and application.
- An appointment will be made with you at your business.
- The first Verification will take 1-2 hours, and will verify every template completed in the FCP.
- A reality check of food preparation areas will be undertaken at this time.
- You may be asked if it is possible to chat with staff members from time to time.

Frequency of Verification will depend on how well you operate.

# What Can I Expect

- Verification is a semi-formal process that will begin with an entry meeting.
- The scope is pre determined before the meeting, this is confirmed at the meeting.
- You will need your FCP and all records requested.
- You will be advised of the process for Corrective Action Requests, and Recommendations.
- Any issues Identified will be discussed at the time "No Surprises."

#### The Verification

- The Verifier will ask a range of questions during the verification.
- The questions used are intended to understand your business as much as possible.
- The Verifier will actively listen to your answers to assess compliance with the Food Control Plan.
- Notes will be taken during the verification process, you are welcome to request to see these notes.
- The notes will form the base of the Verification Report, and will contain any recommendations or CAR's identified.

# What is a Recommendation?

- A recommendation is given where has been an area for improvement identified.
- Areas for improvement are non critical to food safety.
- Areas for Improvement are recorded as a Strong Recommendation or Recommendation in the Verification report.
- You will generally be given until the next verification to address these areas identified.
- If they have not been addressed by this time and are ongoing, you may be issued a Corrective Action Request (CAR).
- Verification uses a graduated enforcement approach to improve operational issues.

# What is a Corrective Action Request?

- A Corrective Action Request (CAR) is given when there is a serious or ongoing problem that has been identified.
- The time frame for completing (Closing Out) a CAR is agreed with you at the time of the verification.
- The more serious the problem the less time will be suggested.
- You may be instructed to fix it immediately if it is an issue to food safety, or be issued an Improvement Notice.

# What is an Improvement Notice?

- An Improvement Notice is a tool used for serious or ongoing non compliance.
- If you are issued with an improvement notice it is likely that your activity poses a serious threat to food safety.
- An Improvement Notice is the last resort used by a Food Safety Officer under the Food Act 2014.
- An Improvement Notice will add additional charges to the cost of running your business.

# How often will I be Verified?

- The frequency of verification is set in the Food Act Regulations.
- The sliding scale ranges from every 3 months to every 18 Months.
- More frequent verification are for business who are not managing their food safety responsibilities well.
- Frequent Verifications are likely to be partial verifications.
- Less frequent Verifications are for business that have demonstrated that they manage their responsibilities well.

The better you operate, the less it will cost!
